

The hunt is on – at the top of Battersea Power Station!

On Sunday 2nd May, two of our intrepid hunt writers will be among the first ever people to abseil down the iconic Battersea Power Station, raising money for Mines Advisory Group (MAG) in the process.

Once known as 'The Cathedral of Power', the station was built to be a powerful, visible symbol of the new age ushered in by electricity. However, it ceased to operate in 1983 and despite many attempts since to regenerate the Grade II* listed building, it has remained empty and is now thought to be one of the most 'at-risk' buildings in Britain.

MAG have become the first charity to obtain consent for a sponsored abseil down the London landmark and London Treasure Hunts are proud, if a little scared, to be taking part in this unique event.
